What is forced labour, human trafficking and modern slavery?

- Modern Slavery: Umbrella term that includes a range of conduct all of which involve a victim being exploited or deprived of their freedom through coercion, threats, violence or deception.
- Forced Labour: Involuntary work under threat of penalty (ILO Forced Labour Convention)
- Human Trafficking: Recruitment, harbouring and/or movement of a person through threats, force, coercion or deception for the purpose of exploitation (UN Protocol to Prevent, Suppress and Punish Trafficking in Persons, Especially Women and Children)



SDG Target 8.7

Take immediate and effective measures to eradicate forced labour, end modern slavery and human trafficking and secure the prohibition and elimination of the worst forms of child labour, including recruitment and use of child soldiers, and by 2025 end child labour in all its forms.



Why is it important stock exchanges consider sustainability reporting on FL/HT/MS?

- Private sector is key to ending slavery and trafficking
 - G7, G20, UNGA, and UNSC have all called on governments to partner with the private sector to address modern slavery and human trafficking
- Investors need more and better data
 - Sustainable investments total USD 35.3 trillion AUM (as of 2020), or more than 1/3 of all assets in five of the world's biggest capital markets
- FL/HT/MS are material risks
 - Non-compliance with existing and emerging laws can and will affect stock price, reduce profits and harm the reputation of exchanges







SECTION B: INDUSTRY RISKS - PROPERTY & CONSTRUCTION

- Temporary, short-term and day laborers are employed
- Widespread use of contractors and subcontractors
- Wages are commonly below minimum wage
- Accommodation in construction camps can be unsafe
- Hazardous working environments

Risk Assessment

Your organization has mapped its operations, employees, direct suppliers and value chain and assessed them for modern slavery risks.

Specific types of modern slavery risks were identified (such as forced labor, child labor, debt bondage, deceptive recruitment practices, etc.), including where it occurs in your operations and value chain, what its relevant indicators are (such as loss of freedom of movement, failure to check worker age, payment of recruitment fees, or complaints about contract substitution, etc.), and whether you cause, contribute or are directly linked to the risk.

Salient risks were prioritized for attention based on severity and likelihood.

- The severity of the impact on the people affected is assessed by considering how grave the impact would be, how widespread (i.e., how many people it would affect) and how hard it would be to remediate the resulting harm; and,
- The likelihood of risk occurring is considered (noting that the most severe risks should be prioritised even if there is a low likelihood of occurring).

Identify the specific type of modern slavery risks if possible (such as forced labor, child labor, debt bondage, deceptive recruitment practices, etc), where it occurs in your operations and value chain, what its relevant indicators are (such as loss of freedom of movement, failure to check worker age, payment of recruitment fees, or complaints about contract substitution, etc), and whether you cause, contribute or are directly linked to the risk.

Prioritize the salient risks in your modern slavery risks for attention based on severity and likelihood:

- Assess the severity of the impact on the people affected, considering how grave the impact would be, how widespread (i.e., how many people would it affect) and how hard it would be to remediate the resulting harm; and,
- Consider the likelihood of risk occurring (noting that the most severe risks should be prioritised even if there is a low likelihood of occurring).

Details of your risk assessment process including value chain mapping, risk indicators (such as vulnerable groups, and geographic, industry/product, and entity/practice risks) and risk assessment tools and/or service providers you use to assist.

Description of modern slavery risks across the company's operations and value chain, explaining which risks are salient and why and highlighting which are your priority to address.





OPPORTUNITIES FOR COLLABORATION

Walk Free, together with FAST, is open to exploring new partnerships with exchanges to raise awareness of modern slavery and promote better standards, practices and disclosures. Potential collaboration could include:

- Linking our Modern Slavery Benchmarking Tool on your websites
- Partnering to develop modern slavery guidance, that is tailored to your economies and listings (similar to SET)
- Hosting an awareness-raising event on how companies can use modern slavery risk data – Global Estimates of Modern Slavery will be released this month and Global Slavery Index in 2023
- Providing content for sustainability portals to educate listed companies



The challenge with "S" data in ESG and how to overcome it



The challenge

Finding "S" data that can be reliably used in decision-making to address issues of forced labor, human trafficking and other forms of modern slavery.

How to address it

- Use a risk focus
- Do not rely on company self-reporting
- Data generated via transparent, rules-based methodology

Global, local coverage in 23 major business languages



+95% of the world's GDP (2021) is covered by the 23 languages in which RepRisk conducts its research, based on the official language indicated per country.



Our research scope comprises 28 ESG Issues in line with key international standards

47% of companies in the RepRisk dataset had social incidents during the last two years (approximately 34,000)


10% of forced labor and 19% of child labor

The shape of human trafficking in three key sectors








Unravelling 5 dimensions of human trafficking







Evolution of key human rights topics








Social issues overlap to the other pillars of ESG
